

2022 Essex County Teen Arts Award-Winning Works

2023 **CELEBRATION OF THE ARTS**

THE FIRST IN-PERSON ESSEX COUNTY TEEN ARTS FESTIVAL WILL TAKE PLACE AT ESSEX **COUNTY COLLEGE IN NEWARK ON MAY 3RD AND 4TH AND WILL BE DEVOTED TO VISUAL ARTS.**

The festival debuted last year as virtual gallery with constructive criticism of student work provided by professional artists from around New Jersey. During last year's program, 200 students from 22 different schools throughout the county submitted pieces to be included. Of those 200 pieces of artwork, 24 advanced to the state Teen Arts Festival.

Three of the students who went to the state program were interviewed about their experiences. One student

from Newark who currently attends Arts High School said, "I submitted an oil pastel drawing of my friend using warm and cool colors trying to make it as realistic as possible. This was my first artwork to ever be in a public art show. I was very happy that my art teacher selected my art to be exhibited in the show. I was a bit nervous at first thinking about all the people looking at the work, but I soon settled down and became very excited. I would like to be part of it this year, but it would be up to my teachers to select the work. I would suggest that artists have strong, positive feelings while creating and take risks."

Another student from Newark who attends Technology High School said, "The piece from last year was a fish bowl drawing that I decided to do once I started looking into perspective drawings that weren't one, two, or three points. And the environment that I chose was the

inside of a typical suburban interior design that one may recognize or not. I chose pencil as my medium because I wasn't much experienced in other mediums such as watercolor or acrylics. It was actually the second time I've competed in an art festival. I was first introduced to the Scholastic Arts and Writing Competition where I submitted my art piece first before starting with Teen Arts. Last year was the first time that I've participated in a festival specifically for artists. It was actually my art teacher at the time who encouraged me to partake in upcoming art events. So, I was decided that I would like to participate in at least a couple of festivals before I graduate. I was given some contests that were upcoming at the time and later came upon the one Essex County was hosting. I decided to participate since it was the very first one being hosted by Essex County. And as an art student, some advice that I'll give to other students is to find







your own preferences when it comes to different art forms while straying out of your comfort zone once in a while. Look into different people's artwork, use real references, the internet, it's all there for you to utilize. It's important to practice different mediums to see yourself grow as an artist, but most importantly is to just passionately have fun and make art."

A student from West Caldwell who attends James Caldwell High School said, "My piece was a vector drawing that I made on Adobe Illustrator. This was a portrait of me and my teacher

taken on a 0.5 lens. This was the first time one of my pieces was submitted to the Teen Arts Festival. Last year my experience with the Teen Arts Festival was amazing. It was nice to be around so many talented artists. The judging made me more confident in my art as well as let me know how to make it better. I definitely had a lot of fun and there were so many different activities for us to do [at the state festival]. I am planning on submitting another piece this year. Some advice I'd give is to not be too worried about what you submit. The piece that got me high honors is

one I'd never expect to do so good. Also, don't underestimate your art!"

This year's program in Essex County will once again focus on the visual arts. The in-person program will feature a display of student artwork and many workshops for the students to attend to both hone their craft and learn more about being a professional artist in the 21st century. A main staple of our Essex County Cherry Blossom Festival activities are the Cherry Blossom Talks in which we share the history of our very beautiful and popular Cherry Blossom groves. This year, the Talks are being moved to the senior building in nearby Essex County Belleville Park while construction of a new Cherry Blossom Center is undertaken.

The Belleville Park senior building is located at 343 Belleville Avenue, Belleville, near the intersection of Belleville Avenue and Branch Brook Drive. It is adjacent to Branch Brook Park and Hendricks Field Golf Course and also is the home to many cherry blossom trees.

There is a spacious parking lot with ample disabled parking next to the building. There are two patios on either side of the building that can be reached by gently sloping paths. The main room inside the senior center is large and has plenty of seating for patrons who have come to enjoy the talks. The building also has restroom facilities with accessibility for the disabled.
