



New Archives Space at the Historic Parks

The traditional home for the Essex
County Department of Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Affairs Archives is the historic Parks Administration Building located in Newark. This building, built in 1916, is currently undergoing an extensive restoration and update project. It has been projected that the renovations will take two years as the building is repaired and renewed to provide a more patronand staff-friendly space.

As part of the upgrades, the Archives will experience quite a few changes to its previous spaces. The collections storage areas will be greatly expanded to provide more adequate space for the artifacts. Thanks to reconfiguring some offices, the storage area will now include approximately twice as much space as before. To make the collection more accessible to researchers, the Archives office will now include a reading room area with new tables and spaces that are in keeping with best practices in the Archives and Library field.

In addition to securing more space, some items from the collection are receiving special pampering. The Archives is



images of the maps to allow for greater access. Two of the maps will be rehoused (placed in new storage boxes that can best protect them). The other two maps will be framed in a way that both protects them and allows the Archives to display these treasures to the delight of park patrons.

During the Parks Administration Building restoration project, the Archives has moved to satellite offices in West



Opened in 2005, the Essex County Environmental Center has become the epicenter of environmental

education by providing school children and their families with a unique opportunity to learn about nature and gain an appreciation for conservation in an interactive atmosphere.

The building is handicap accessible via a ramp on the parking lot side of the building to the main entrance. Once inside, there is an information desk on the left. There are exhibits throughout the first floor along with classrooms, a library and gift shop. The main exhibit resembles a small house that offers interactive activities to teach visitors about electricity and energy conservation. There is a ramped doorway into the exhibit. Public restrooms have ADA accessible stalls and sinks. There is a small lip to enter the restrooms.

Behind the Environmental Center is a large deck with a ramp leading down into rustic hiking trails that enter the woods behind the building. The trails lead to the Passaic River and then turn west to loop back around to the other side of the facility where Garibaldi Hall and the boat launch are located. The trail surfaces have wood chips and can be difficult to move on, especially if the weather has been wet. There is also a paved sidewalk that leads from the end of the back deck ramp around the side of the Environmental Center building and takes you back to the parking lot and front of the building.

There are several gardens and another parking lot near Garibaldi Hall and the boat launch. This second parking lot also has an entrance to Eagle Rock Avenue. In addition to the trails that go between this area and the Environmental Center building, there is another Boardwalk Trail, which is made of wooden planks that meets up with Patriot's Path further out into the woods. There is a gravel path that extends from the paved parking area to the beginning of the bridge of the Boardwalk Trail. The section of Patriot's Path that joins Boardwalk Trail is not paved. There is adequate space to turn around at the end of the Boardwalk Trail. This is a sidewalk that stretches between the Environmental Center building and this additional area. However, please be aware that there are plants, shrubs, and trees that may encroach on the width of the sidewalk.

With the use of ALT text, when the reading software encounters an image, the software will be able to describe the image in words.

The use of ALT text was recommended by members of the Essex County Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Affairs Accessibility Advisory Group.







preserve this historic home. The historians

clues that helped us discover the history
