

Open Space Legislation for a Preliminary Park Commission

The bill to create a commission for Essex County to map out and report on a plan for a park system was introduced to the New Jersey legislature on April 26, 1894 as Senate Bill No. 205. Initially referred to the Committee on Municipal Corporations, it then passed the Senate and the Assembly. On May 8, Governor Werts signed it into law.

The law authorized the presiding justice of the New Jersey Supreme Court to appoint a commission of five persons for the term of two years, to "consider the advisability of laying out ample open spaces for the use of the public." In addition, the commission would have the "authority to make maps and plans of such spaces and to collect ... other information in relation thereto." Finally, the commission was to "make a report in writing of a comprehensive plan for laying out, acquiring, and maintaining such open spaces." They were permitted to hire staff. Total expenses over the term of the committee were not to exceed \$10,000.
