





ACTIVITY: WHAT'S FOR DINNER

Like strands in a web, all plants and animals in Essex County Parks depend on each other for survival. Just like people, animals eat all different kinds of food. Herbivores eat plants. Carnivores eat other animals. Omnivores eat both plants and animals. Some creatures are the recyclers of the natural world. They help to recycle nutrients by eating dead stuff.

ACTIVITY: I SPY

Five Tips for Watching Wildlife

Look in the right place, at the right time.

Knowing a little about the connection between animals and their habitats will help you know where to look for wildlife.

Extend your senses.

Try using special equipment: binoculars, spotting scopes or magnifying glasses.

Blend into your surroundings.

Wild animals are sensitive to disturbances in their environment. Some helpful hints include: Walk slowly and keep your voices low, approach from downwind, move only when necessary, crouch down and hide your eyes.

Bring a field guide or two.

Field guides help us to identify and learn about natural history. Find the right guide as they come in all shapes, sizes and degrees of difficulty.

Respect wildlife.

Remember to be respectful as you watch wildlife and back away if you notice the animal is in distress or nervous. Never attempt to touch a wild animal.




DID YOU KNOW?

DID YOU KNOW? Hummingbird wings are very small, so the birds have to work extra hard to stay in the air. The Ruby Throated Hummingbird beats its wings about 50 times per second during flight!


